FEMINIST TECHNO-IMAGINARIES: FEMINIST ENCOUTNERS WITH TECHNOLOGY FROM AFROFUTURISM TO CYBERFEMINISM



The purpose of this course is to introduce students to feminist perspectives on modern technology such as computers,

neuroprosthetics, reproductive technology, and social media. These perspectives include critical responses to white patriarchal traditions dominant in science discourse such as feminist technoscience and new materialism as well as future-oriented imaginaries that center the technologized female body such as afrofuturism and

cyberfeminism. We will pay particular attention to the work of feminists of color, whose absence is often noted but rarely addressed in feminist technology studies. While many of our readings are theoretical, these traditions are not reducible to theory. As such, we will also explore these traditions by discussing the art, music, literature, and performance that inform them. Authors include Katherine N.
